Sermon Discussion Questions

Same Issues, Years Later
Acts 21:17-36

1. Why does Paul want to go back to Jerusalem so badly? See Acts 19:21; 20:22-24; 24:17; Romans 15:21-24.
2. What does James' report of the thousands of Jews who believe and are zealous for the law in verse 20 tell us about the relationship between early Christian faith and Jewish tradition at the time?
3. The elders in Jerusalem present a concern about rumors that Paul was teaching Jews living among the Gentiles to abandon Moses (verse 21). What does this misunderstanding or miscommunication suggest about the diversity and potential tensions within the early Christian community?
4. What signs were there that James' "Jewish" Christianity and Paul's "Gentile" Christianity were compatible? If so, what is the problem/point of difficulty?
5. The Jerusalem church leaders in Acts 21:15-26 suggest that Paul should partake in a purification ritual to prove his adherence to the Mosaic law. How does this event relate to the theological tension throughout the early chapters of Acts, culminating in the decision in Acts 15?
6. Read Acts 21:22-26. What does James recommend as a solution to the tension? How does Paul's action here reflect principles he himself has laid down elsewhere? (Acts 20:24; 1 Corinthians 9:20-23; 10:32,33) What does this say about the balance between cultural sensitivity and theological purity in the Christian community? How might these same principles affect our own attitudes toward others?
7. Read Acts 21:27-36. What are the parallels between Paul's suffering and Christ's? Why is it important for us personally?
8. Read Acts 21:30-39. What does it tell us about Paul, that he would turn and speak to the mob when he did?
9. Final thoughts: How might Paul's actions in this passage serve as a model for Christian leaders when dealing with potential divisions and misunderstandings within their congregations today?
