SERMON DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

1. **The Appetite That Never Closes** (5:10-12) The Preacher says whoever loves money will never have enough of it — that increased wealth just brings more people to feed from it, and the rich man's full stomach won't even let him sleep. He's diagnosing something deeper than greed: An appetite that cannot be filled by the thing it craves. Where do you feel the truth of this in your own life? Now read John 4:13-14 and John 6:35. Jesus does not say the appetite is wrong — he says he is the only one who satisfies it. What would it look like this week to bring your actual hunger (financial anxiety, the next purchase, the "if I just had...") to Christ instead of to the thing the Preacher says will never fill it?

2. **Naked He Came, Naked He Goes** (5:13-17) The Preacher tells the story of a man who hoarded wealth, lost it, and died with nothing in his hand for his son. As he came from his mother's womb he shall go again, naked as he came (5:15). The Preacher is right — we leave with nothing. But read Philippians 2:5-8 alongside this. Christ did the opposite: He came clothed in glory and was stripped naked on a cross, so that we who come into the world naked could be clothed with him (Galatians 3:27, Revelation 7:9). How does it change the weight of 5:15 to know that the One who carried our nothing into death also carried us out the other side? Where in your life are you still trying to die with something in your hand?

3. **The Man Who Has Everything** (6:1-6) This is the cruelest observation in the book. A man is given wealth, possessions, honor — everything he could want — and God does not give him the power to enjoy it. The Preacher says a stillborn child is better off than he is (6:3). What does it mean that enjoyment itself is a gift, not just the wealth, but the capacity to receive it? Where have you seen this in someone's life (without naming names)? Read James 1:17 and 1 Timothy 6:17 — God richly provides us with everything to enjoy. Now answer honestly: What has God already given you that you are not enjoying right now? Your spouse. Your kids at the dinner table. The home you live in. The church you belong to. The body you have. Pick one specifically. What does it look like — this week, in concrete actions — to ask God for the capacity to enjoy that gift instead of asking him for the next one?

4. **The Question Only Someone Else Can Answer** (6:10-12) The Preacher closes with two questions he cannot answer: Who knows what is good for man? And who can tell him what will be after him? Read Micah 6:8 and John 14:1-6. Jesus answers both questions in his own person — he is the good, and he is the one who has been to the other side and come back. Now think of one specific area of your life right now where you are living as though no one knows what is good — a parenting decision, a career question, a conflict you're avoiding, a financial choice, a relationship you're unsure about. What does it actually mean, in that exact decision, that Christ has answered the "what is good" question? And think of one fear you carry about what comes after — your own death, a loved one's death, your kids' future, your aging parents. What does it mean, in that exact fear, that the One preparing a place for you has been there and come back? Don't leave the question abstract.
