- 1. Amos denounces Israel for selling the righteous for silver and the needy for a pair of sandals (Amos 2:6). The wealthy lounge on ivory beds and feast while the poor suffer (Amos 6:4–6). In James 5:1–6, James condemns the rich who exploit laborers and live in self-indulgence. How do we see forms of exploitation or disregard for the poor in our own society? In what subtle ways might we benefit from or ignore such systems?
- 2. In Amos 2:6–8 and 8:4–6, God condemns Israel for sins they failed to see or refused to acknowledge: Oppressing the poor, distorting justice, and turning religion into a cover for greed. These were not isolated failings but deeply ingrained cultural patterns that seemed "normal" to them. Why do you think God's people were blind to these particular sins, even while maintaining active religious practices?
- 3. In Amos 5:21–24, God says He despises Israel's religious festivals and offerings because their worship is divorced from justice. Why do you think Israel thought their worship was acceptable to God, even while ignoring justice? How might we fall into the same trap today? Where in your life do you sense the temptation to "perform" spiritually (attending, giving, singing) without engaging with God's heart for the vulnerable?
- 4. In a sermon, Charles Spurgeon described three groups of people "at ease in Zion" (Amos 6:1–6):
 - a. The apathetic they don't care; not cruel, but indifferent.
 - b. The self-indulgent they care, but their love of comfort keeps them from sacrifice.
 - c. The procrastinators they know they should act, but they delay and never do.
 - Which of these categories do you most identify with in your own spiritual life right now? How does the Gospel free us from these postures of ease and move us toward compassion, sacrifice, and action?
